
In my opinion, the combination of superbly well maintained roads, mountainous terrain, low traffic and extraordinary scenery makes Colorado the best State in the US to motorcycle. The higher elevation brought cooler temperatures, 60s to mid 80s most of the day.

Today's route was truly awing and I had to remind myself to focus and keep my eyes on the road, from sweeping turns to some fairly tight switchbacks, steep ascends/descends. On several turns, the price for going too wide would have been high given the steep drop offs and/or blind on coming traffic.

Leaving Grand Junction on I-70 east to CO-65 south toward Mesa and Cedaredge, then east on Hwy 92 toward Crawford and Blue Mesa Reservoir. Continue to CO-149 south toward Lake City and Creede to my overnight in South Fork.


Day 31 - Saturday, July 1st. 2017

Today's was basically slabbing it to Dallas. I-40 to Amarillo, then 287 to 114 to 635 to 75 to the Metroplex. Living in Dallas is great except that it take 1 travel day in each direction to get to good/great motorcycling terrain. The exception is Hill Country to the South and Big Bend NP South-West.

Dwain had done the Dallas-Amarillo route on his way to meet me in UT 8-9 days ago and the

heat was brutal, 100-110 F. Today, we were lucky, thunderstorms cooled off the day and by the time we rode the last 200 or so miles, it was dry as a bone and the temps between 80-90 F. I never saw my thermometer go above 90.

The route is what it is, long and bland having ridden it multiple times before.








I was very thankful that both Dwain and I made it home safely.

Over the next few days it will be bike maintenance and a deep cleaning. I will also look at my notes and provide an overall summary, insights on gear, what I would do differently, etc over the next couple of weeks.

A total of 12,250 miles in 31 days, 29 actual riding (1 day each Kayak and Fishing) or an average of 422 miles per day. It really didn't feel like a ton of riding except the first and last day to begin and end the ride.

Keith, I took the Darien jacket to use as a rain jacket in AK and for a just in case I get tired of the one piece suit. I also had Darien pants and Meshed pants for my return trip through UT and CO. It turned out that I did not need the Darien pants at all, AK and Canada were cool and I used my heated gear and Areostich everyday until I got to UT.

The Darien Pants I used once during my fishing trip over my hiking pants only.

It turns out I was blessed with weather, while sometimes cooler than normal, it was dry 29/31 days and the Darien jacket as a rain jacket was not needed.

I did use it with my meshed pants/Darien combo everyday from UT to Home where the temps were higher, especially UT, 95-102° F. To save room, you can interchange the padding on the Aerostich and the Darien and carry one set.


Thank y'all for the well wishes.

Bike is setup is upgraded seat to Sergent, BMW Pillion cover, ROX 2" risers, easy to adjusted and I used these a lot on the Fairbanks to Prudhoe haul road. I added a phone holder, 2 USB chargers up front and wired the top case with a USB and power outlet. Most important to me was the redundant heated gear power. All these were wired to a PDM 60, which is solid state and you can reset the circuits by turning power off/on.

The Darien jacket and pants fold very compact and are light, especially without pads that you can interchange with the roadcrafter/R3.



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

MOST VALUABLE: Heated Gear

The most valued piece of gear was my heated jacket and pant liners, heated socks. Gloves less so. I used the jacket and pants everyday and it made the cold disappear. The heated socks came in handy during my Prudhoe run, it was 30-34° F.

The best part about the gear I that you put it on and have total control between 30-80° F at the touch of the controls, yet without the bulk of layers.

I found the gloves too thick and bulky, and difficult to feather the clutch through construction zones on the Dalton Hwy. Also with heated grips, they were a nice to have vs a must have.

I wore an Aerostich R3 one piece, but any goretex setup would work just as well. Make sure it's rainproof as rain tends to come and go at a moments notice.

I live in Dallas, so I seldom need heated gear, but for a trip up north, where the temps are 50-70° in July, I would forgo many things, but would definitely invest in the heated gear. Total cost was less than \$500, picked up on sale and the gloves AdvRider flea market...AB

As I was prepping for the trip, I went out and bought a 12 megapixel \$150 point and shoot camera, my biggest decision for buying it was because it was waterproof. It only had a 5x Zoom and the picture quality was mediocre.

Unfortunately I ran out of time and did not test it, I figured it would be better than my iPhone. Well, I have far more respect for iPhone camera capabilities given that my best shots were the ones taken with it. The waterproof aspect was in my brain, a any camera would have been adequate. When it really rains, there is nothing to photograph anyway. Also, especially for Alaska, a good zoom is key to photograph wildlife.

The biggest advantage of the point and shoot was my ability to take pictures on the go, ideally, any good point and shoot should be able to do that. I also need to look at how to mount it so it's readily accessible.







MOST UTILIZED ITEMS: riding suit and boots

My Aerostich R3 was simply brilliant, I used it daily, cleaned it at the car wash and never leaked a drop. I can put it on and take it off in 2 minutes and I like the high visibility. It vents fairly well in moderate heat, 75-85, I felt well protected and blessed that I did not have to put it to the test, but Aerostich is well made and has an awesome reputation.

My Sidi riding boots were great, good support and protection, totally waterproof and easy to clean at the car wash. I also walked in them quite a bit and they were very comfortable with a good grip in all sorts of terrain.

I brought my Darien jacket and pants, I thought I would use the jacket as a rain jacket and then later on when I would ride through the lower 48. Never used the pants to ride, only to fish in Homer. In Utah, I defaulted to my mesh pants and the Darien jacket, the combo made the heat tolerable, although I would have preferred a mesh jacket as well.

The takeaway: Alaska is cold, even in the summer, err on too warm! ...AB

MOST CONTROVERSIAL: Tires

Do I dare go there? Of course, it's my experience and remember YMMV.

I read several ride reports on tires, their performance, ups and downs, longevity etc. and finally decided to put on a new set of Heidenau Scout K60s hoping that they would last the 12,000 miles quoted in many reviews.

The fresh K60 performed well on the road and dry dirt. When wet the rear tended to wash out relative to my experience with TKC80. The front was fine and aside from it singing at 50MPH and then fading away as the speed reached 55-60, it was great on both wet/dry pavement and dirt. I actually got used to the singing and liked it because I knew when I reached or slowed down to 50MPH.

I was hoping that the tires would last the 12K, but my rear was noticeably worn at 5,000 miles and needed to be replaced at 7,000. Not bad for a rear with a loaded bike, I just had the wrong expectation.

Keep in mind that Canada chip seal eats tires fast, I talked to several other riders and they all had the same experience.

The BMW dealer in Anchorage did not carry Heidenau, so I opted for a Continental TKC70. My K60 front will probably last 15,000 miles or more. For me, the rear Conti TKC70 was grippier in wet pavement and about the same on dirt when compared to the Heidenau K60.

What would I do different? - short answer, not much, other than to plan on a rear tire change.

If I could have my cake and eat it too, I would put on TKC70/K60 to get to say Watson Lake, YT and then change the rear only to a TKC80 for Hwy 4 to Faro, the run to Prudhoe Bay on the Dalton, the Denali Hwy and then go back to TKC70/K60. The TKC80 will be well worn by then. The front K60 is very good in both grip and longevity. I love the TKC80s, yes they wear out fast, but grip like tractor tires on wet dirt/gravel/clay, perfect for the Calcium-Chloride soaked construction zones on the Dalton Hwy.


If traveling from the lower 48, plan on at least 1 rear tire change, if starting with new tires.

For me the TKC70 rear has a slight edge on the K60 on wet surfaces, never tried a front. That will be my next tire test. Remember YMMV...AB



MOST SILLY: Things I worried about the Dalton Hwy and Alaska while planning

I read way to much stuff as part of my prep for the big trip up north. While I found tons of helpful materials there were a few that made me hesitate a bit, but I was determined to press on.

"Your bike will never be the same" after the Dalton, you will destroy it, baloney! I have a shiny 9 month old 2016 1200GSA and I want it to last me at least 5 years & 100,000 miles. Yes, the Dalton is a tough road, 75% unpaved, lots of pot holes, large gravel, corrosive calciumchloride everywhere and long, a 1,000 mile round trip from Fairbanks. Adventure bikes are made to soak up the potholes, lay on their side when too slippery and last a long time. I can honestly say that after a thorough washing, you can't tell that I rode it to Prudhoe Bay, the calcium-chloride washed off with a car pressure washer, and absolutely nothing broke on the bike. I would not hesitate to ride it north again.

"Trucks will run you down on the Dalton", actually, I found truckers extremely polite and cautious as we approached each other. Both slowing down and giving each other as much room as we could. I much rather encounter trucks on the Dalton Hwy than on I-20 in Texas. Also, on the 500 mile stretch, I probably encountered maybe 20 trucks each way, so truck traffic is sparse. I had one a\$\$hole water-truck that did not shut the spraying down and doused me pretty good, but all others were professional and courteous.

"Construction really slows you down", call me lucky, I encountered a few construction zones, but for the number of miles I traveled, it was not bad at all. The longest wait was 15 minutes and usually much less, 5-10 minutes at most. I made excellent use of my stop and took the opportunity to stretch my legs, talk to flag people, hydrate and snack.

"Too much distance between gas stops", gas was plentiful with 2 exceptions, the Dalton north of Coldfoot to Prudhoe Bay (240 miles) and Hwy 4 between Watson Lake and Faro (263 miles). Additionally for both of these gas stations, make sure you have a credit/debit card, they were unattended. In Faro, the magnetic stripe on my credit card would not register and had to use my newer less used debit card to gas up. Also for Garmin GPS users, the map set does not have all the gas stations listed, google is much better. My recommendation, fill up once your bike gets to less than 1/2 at the first gas station you see, unless you are headed of the beaten pass, then fill up before going there or make sure you know your range.

Rain, mosquitos, reservations. Maybe I was lucky, the rain I encountered was sporadic other than 1 day out of 20. A bit like a Florida shower although much lighter. Same for mosquito, if

you want to avoid them, go in early June, I didn't have any encounters. Same for hotel reservations, I never had a problem finding a place to stay. I was told a lot of it was due to oil being \$45 a barrel, temporary workers and general business is down.

My entire trip was awesome, and I always had one motto, when you encounter rain, gravel, or not sure, speed is your enemy, slow gets you there. Remember YMMV...AB

I bought the R3 because I live in Texas, so wanted cooler. The Classic is too hot, the R3 is good Labor Day to Memorial Day. I have a 2 piece roadcrafter classic, but I found it too bulky with heated gear underneath. The R3/heated gear combo was perfect for Alaska. The one piece slips on/off in less than 2 minutes, very easy and great when you want to break to relax. With the 2 piece you then to just take your jacket off.

For gloves, my favorite pair is from when I was an expat in Sydney, unbranded and they are made out of kangaroo leather, only thing is they are not waterproof. I brought a pair of Klim goretex as well as vented BMW airflow.

I think an RT with road tires would have been fine on everything I rode except Fairbanks to Prudhoe bay and Hwy 4. When I was there, the Denali Hwy was perfect and I would have ridden it with Anakee3. I have heard the Denali has been a mess in the past.

Please remember the biggest unknown/challenge is road construction, it can be super slippery, especially after it's watered down to keep the dust down, and it varies day to day. Road conditions in Alaska are ever-changing, just like weather!

You can buy stuff in Alaska - Although slightly more expensive, you can buy almost anything in Alaska, especially in Fairbanks and Anchorage. I saw people hauling stuff, especially tires and cooking gas bottles as if they were heading into never, never land. Unless you have an odd requirement, there is no need to haul stuff. Also you can ship to and from Alaska, a lighter bike is always a more comfortable bike.

Overpacking - I was fortunate to meet my family 1/2 way through my trip, I sent lots of extra stuff home with them, shoes, shirts, gear. I suppose you can also ship them home or give away some of it. Laundry is pretty easy and I wore my riding gear for 80% of the day.

Shield cleaning secret - Fellow rider Steve shared him helmet shield cleaning secret, also showed me. Lemon pledge wipes and micro cloth to wipe dry. Yes gets rid of all the bug juice.

<u>Adjust one mirror when riding on the pegs</u> - When riding on dirt and standing on the pegs, make sure to adjust one of your mirrors so you can see what a behind you. I had a pickup truck nearly scrape me on the Dalton.

Camping - I think camping a bit would definitely add to the experience. Personally, I have really never tried camping other than a day or two with family. One of my goals is to learn and hopefully camp a few nights on my next trip. I have to say, that the convenience of a hotel is hard to beat, but you do miss out on meeting other riders and campers.

InReach Explorer - the 2nd best companion or best companion when riding solo, there is no substitute for a riding buddy, but sometimes it's hard to find someone with 30+ days of vacation. I felt very comfortable traveling solo because I had it. 100% coverage wherever you go and my wife could keep track of me. In case of emergency, from a breakdown in the middle of nowhere to a come-off, I could get help. Make sure you carry it with you on your person, not attached to the bike.

Cooler - it was nice to have cold drinks during breaks and a place to keep left over beer and food. (Beer only at the end of the day after the bike is parked for the day). Other than Coldfoot, only to consume at a restaurant, Prudhoe Bay totally dry, you could buy beer almost anywhere.

<u>Alaska Ferry network</u> - If you can, do take one, it's a nice break from the bike and totally worth it. The scenery from the water is spectacular, also, I saw whales, sea lions, and seals. Fairly inexpensive when compared to any excursion. Bring straps to tie down your bike.

Reservations - I never made any and was able to land in an affordable hotel every night by either calling ahead at around 3-4PM or simply showing up. I didn't know where I was going to end up for the day.






