
Day 1 - 8/24/21, Home to Amarillo, TX










Notice the long morning shadow







Day 3 – 8/26/21, Las Petacas (Taos), Carson National Forest, NM to Durango, CO

The day was so clear, you could see for 40-60 miles.












Look at the center near the bottom on how they built homes into the cliffs.








As the sun set, so many stars came out, I could not photograph them with my iPhone. Sagittarius is superimposed with an iPhone app, it was an aweing sight.

Day 8 – 8/31/21, Ventura, CA – Channel Island National Park




On the boat, they also had 2 sealion pups that had been rehabilitated and were going to be released back to their habitat.












The island has many small foxes, on the way back we cruised by some offshore oil rigs, apparently, they have been there for 30 years, way before regulation.
