

# Road Art - 1<sup>st</sup> Trip - Days 41-51 (End)


#### Day 41 - 10/04/21, Pinnacles National Park, CA to Lake Nacimiento, CA






The rock formations looked like people perched on the mountain. It reminded me of a very different and natural Mt Rushmore.



Located near the San Andreas Fault, Pinnacle is an excellent example of tectonic plate movement. This movement gave way to the above formations and between it and the fault action and earthquakes it formed the caves photographed below.





The talus caves of the park were formed when steep, narrow canyons were filled with a jumbled mass of boulders from the cliffs above.






I could not stop myself from thinking what happens if there is a tremor and I am buried in these caves, LOL




Eventually there was daylight again.

They had a "Museum" of the living quarters, very modest.














## And of course, a beautiful church

After breakfast, I had a nice walk on the beach, a bit chilly, along with the morning fog.





Santa Barbara Mission is very "Deluxe" and the wealth of Santa Barbara is obvious.








More beautiful coast on my way to Malibu. I boondocked on a quiet street surrounded by multi-million dollar homes, and my van felt like a million bucks as well.


The pier and the End/Start of the famous Route 66. Random paddle board lessons



I continued my journey east, stopping at the Colorado River demarking the border of CA & AZ












Day 51 – 10/13/21, Seminole, TX to Home, Dallas, TX
